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### A: THE DEPARTMENT

The School of Government and International Affairs (SGIA) at Durham University is located in two separate buildings, which are in close proximity to each other; South End House, on the corner of South Road and Elvet Hill Road, accommodates two centrally timetabled teaching rooms, an undergraduate study room with IT access for SGIA students and Wi-Fi access, together with some academic staff offices. The Al-Qasimi Building is just along the road on Elvet Hill Road and is the main School building where the School administrative office is located together with two small lecture rooms, and several seminar/tutorial rooms used for teaching. Wi-Fi internet access is available in the common area for students upstairs. Both buildings are close to several of the University's colleges and within easy walking distance of the University Library and Durham University Business School, approximately 15 minutes walk from Durham city centre and 10 minutes walk from the main lecture theatres on the Science Site where the majority of SGIA's large lectures are held.

### **B: DEGREE STRUCTURE**

The School of Government and International Affairs offers three Honours degrees.

- Politics (BA)
- International Relations (BA)
- Politics and International Relations (BA)

Undergraduate teaching is structured around four main streams: Political Thought, Political Institutions, Political Economy and International Relations. Students move from generalist courses in these areas in their early years to more specialised options in Honours Politics, and International Relations, which explore the diverse and dynamic politics of the contemporary world.

The School also participates in the following Joint Honours degrees:

- Economics and Politics (BA)
- Philosophy and Politics (BA)
- Philosophy, Politics and Economics (BA) (Combined Degree)

All degrees at Durham have a modular structure, consisting of six modules each year for three years. Modules are usually studied over all three terms of the teaching year. All modules are examined or assessed in the year in which they are taught: this means that at the end of the first year there are preliminary examinations, and that the final degree class is determined by the examinations taken in the second and third year.

## IMPORTANT NOTE FOR STUDENTS: PLEASE READ <u>BEFORE</u> COMPLETING YOUR LEARNING AGREEMENT

At Durham University European agreements are signed by individual university departments and are not university-wide agreements. This means that, in general, students will have to choose modules (courses) within the Durham University department through which the European agreement with their home university has been signed (students should check with the Exchange Coordinator in their university if they are not sure which department this is). Modules offered by other departments are subject to availability and can only be taken with prior consent from the relevant department. *Incoming students must take at least 50% of their modules in the host department and can take modules outside in no more than two additional departments*. Certain restrictions may also apply to courses in some departments and students need to follow the advice below carefully before completing their application form.

Please clearly indicate the modules you wish to take in the application form for approval by the respective department(s). Before completing your application form, it is very important that you read carefully the relevant departmental section(s) of the Module Handbook to check which modules are available to you and any restrictions which may apply. It is imperative that a properly completed application form is submitted. Only complete applications can be processed.

Section *D: Module Details* provides a list of modules available for European students in the department where the agreement has been established (receiving department) as well as a list of modules available for students coming in through other departments (external departments). Please choose from these modules only!

### **C2: Departmental Requirements and Restrictions**

The School of Government and International Affairs only offers European exchange placements at Durham **for a full academic year**. European students from a partner university with which SGIA has an European exchange agreement have unrestricted access to the full undergraduate course catalogue for Single Honours Politics and International Relations. Undergraduate exchange students are generally expected to choose modules for their Learning Agreement from year one, two or three of the undergraduate course catalogue. Exchange students are generally expected to select the modules in their Learning Agreement from the SGIA's module catalogue. Modules in other faculties or departments can only be chosen in exceptional cases and on the basis of a separate learning agreement between the student and the relevant department.
