

# **Brief Report for 2015-16**

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## 1. KEY ACHIEVEMENTS: EVENTS, TRAINING AND RESEARCH PROJECTS

#### Selection of current research projects

**Disposal – The Housing Crisis in Horden's Numbered Streets** (2015-16) – investigation of worsening housing crisis in the ex-mining village of Horden, conducted in partnership with Horden Residents' Community Association by Rachel Pain and Durham University Geography students.

Christian responses to debt and financial exclusion (2015-2016) — conducted by Andrew Orton in partnership with the Centre for Theology and Community, funded by the Leech Foundation, this project aims to enable churches and other Christian groups in NE England and London to discuss money issues in their local community and identify collective action for change.

Imagine: connecting communities through research — a large consortium project (£2.2 million) funded by ESRC (2013-2017). CSJCA is coordinating one of four work packages, exploring two former Community Development Project areas in the North East and one in Coventry. 12 community partners have been involved in the NE, with Sarah Banks as Principal Investigator. Very successful dissemination and dialogue workshops in Newcastle, North Shields, and London with Department of Communities and Local Government.
