The Barbarians Come To Town

Five years in the making, we were rewarded with beautiful weather and some wonderful rugby on one of Durham sport's most historic days.

It all began on Friday evening, 2nd May, when 400, mainly alumni, descended on Ramside Hall for a memorable evening, celebrating 150 years of Durham rugby, which for many, continued long into the next morning. Huge congratulations and thanks to former student Mark Durden-Smith who managed to bring some sort of order to the proceedings.

First match on the day itself was a Durham University Past and Present Women's XV taking on a Select XV from the North East. What a game it turned out to be! It took Durham a little time to get into the match and for a while it looked as though they would find it tough to stay with their opposition. Indeed, they went two tries down before fighting back to go into half time 17-10 down.

The second half was a very different affair as Durham spent long periods of time in the opposition half playing some delightful fast flowing rugby. However, try as they might they were unable to break the opposition line, and in fact, it was the North East who recorded the only score of the second half, winning the game 22-10.

A great occasion for all the players, with a very impressive standard of rugby from both sides.

Then came the men's game. The crowd built throughout the day, eventually totalling just over 2,200. Ramside Hall did a wonderful job, providing the drink and food outside while Durham City RFC, as always, did a great job inside, looking after the VIPs and the teams after the game. As the game kicked off at 3pm, there was a wonderful party atmosphere all around the ground.

This was always going to be tough going for Durham University RFC, given the impressive and experienced Barbarian side, led by our own former coach, Alex Key. The Palatinate side found it tough to get a foothold in the game early on, conceding a number of hard running tries and going into half-time some way behind. At this stage there was a danger of the Durham side becoming totally overrun but whatever was said at half time clearly made a huge difference as Durham came out for the second half playing at a totally different tempo. Four well-worked tries were to follow as





BUCS Cricket: Disappointing First Wednesday

Durham's women travelled to Loughborough, always by far the toughest opposition in women's university cricket. We were bowled out for 113, with **Petra Tweedy** (Hatfield) 28 and **Pip Lloyd Williams** (Grey) 26 with Loughborough winning by eight wickets.

Durham men's II were bowled out for 166 and were unable to pull the game back, with York I scoring the required runs for the loss of four wickets. Durham III took on Sheffield I and made a valiant attempt to chase down 255 but were bowled out for 208.

Good news came from Durham V who took on Teesside I. They bowled out the opposition for 181 and passed the target with four wickets in hand.

Second Wednesday - 4 From 6 - a better return!

Durham women's I bowled out Lancaster for 95 and knocked the runs off for the loss of four wickets in 12.2 overs. **Charlotte Pettigrew** (Collingwood) had an excellent day, top scoring with 28 and taking 3 for 10.

Durham women's II had an extraordinary match against Edinburgh II. Batting first, Durham scored a remarkable 334 for 2 in their allotted thirty overs, at a rate of eleven an over, before dismissing Edinburgh for 23. A slight mismatch maybe.

Durham men's II travelled to St Andrews to play their first team and scored a very respectable 232 for 8 before bowling out the Scottish University for 124 in 42 overs. There was also a win for Durham men's III who scored 234 all out before dismissing their opposition 226 in a desperately close game.

Our two defeats came at fourth and fifth team level. Durham IV were unable to chase down Leeds Beckett II 233 for 7, falling well short on 152. Leeds Beckett III scored 332 for 9 as

Plaque Wall Memories: Tim O'Gorman

After leaving Durham in 1989, Tim played for Derbyshire until 1996. Making 117 first class appearances, he scored 5,372 runs.



On finishing his cricketing career Tim continued to play a major role in the game, holding key positions. He served as Chairman of the Professional Cricketers Association for a number of years and held the role as chairman of the MCC Young Cricketers.

Tim has been chosen from the plaque wall to evidence how university sport has changed over the years. He turned out for the university at first team level in cricket, rugby and hockey – a quite remarkable success story. Today it would be almost unheard of for anyone to play in two first teams at Durham in these sports and the thought of three unthinkable.

Playing for British Universities in both cricket and hockey is once again a remarkable achievement unlikely to be repeated in university sport today.

Fantastic Women's Futsal

Durham I, already in the Futsal Championship Final, will now be joined by Durham II as they will contest the Trophy Final on the same day. They travelled to Stirling and won impressively, 8-2. It is still baffling how our women found the eleven-a-side game so challenging this year while subsequently storming into both national futsal finals. Good luck to both of them when they play the final later this month.

Durham University: BUCS National Baseball Champions!

National titles have been hard to come by this year and so this was a wonderful achievement from this very strong outfit. The league stages during the year saw the Durham Wolves dominate with wins against Durham II 27-2, York I 26-2, Sheffield I 31-1, Newcastle I 18-3 and UCLan I 11-3.



Group stages in the finals were a formality for Durham as they overcame Swansea 21-5, Stirling 12-2 and Oxford 26-2, moving comfortably into the semi-final. Once again, they faced and dominated UCLan, winning 12-0.

Their surprise opposition in the final was the University of East Anglia who had finished third in their BUCS League. They

found the going unbelievable tough as the Durham Wolves really turned on the pressure. They went from 4-0 to 8-0 by scoring four runs in a row. The final score of Durham Wolves 21 UEL 1 perhaps tells its own story. Great performance from the Palatinates. Few teams in the history of BUCS will have dominated their opposition quite like this, with a season total of 205 runs scored and 21 conceded – remarkable!

Year's Biggest Rowing Weekend

Considered by many as the biggest and most important event in the university rowing calendar and Europe's largest student rowing event, the first four-day BUCS Regatta took place over the weekend.

Day One: This is mainly concerned with time trials although there were some big finals, and the Palatinates will have been delighted with some of their results.

The highlight came with championship gold for our women's coxed four – a magnificent win for them. Not far behind this, in the other championship final of the day, our men took silver in the coxless four, another outstanding row. Adding to the day's successes, our men's intermediate double won gold.

Day Two: Added success for the Palatinates as they chased yet more medals. The absolute highlight of the day was silver for our men's championship eight in arguably the showcase event of the regatta – a great result for Durham. Not to be out



done, our women's pairs took silver and bronze medals in their championship event. Durham women's championship quad took fifth place in their final. The intermediate events brought delight for Durham men's eight as they won bronze, while our women's pair went one better, taking silver in their event.

Day Three: A mixed set of results for the Palatinates but our best performance by far came in the men's championship quad, with Durham taking silver. A stacked women's championship VIII race saw Durham come home in fifth behind Newcastle, London, Oxford Brookes and Cambridge. In results elsewhere Durham women's intermediate scull came seventh, our women's intermediate eight came ninth while our men's intermediate quad came eighth.

Day Four: Another huge result for Durham as our women's championship coxless four won gold. This result was matched by a superb row from our women's intermediate coxed four who also won gold. There was also an outstanding championship silver for our men's pair.

Durham women's intermediate double finished fourth in the A final, while the men's intermediate pair also finished fourth in their A final.

Durham University Squash: A Review

I am Hannah, and I've been President of the Durham University Squash Club for 2024-25. It's been an amazing year for squash in our Wednesday BUCS matches. Our men's first team was promoted to the Premier League following an undefeated season and our men's II and women's II have also been

promoted to North One after both teams triumphed in the Conference Cup finals in Manchester. Our men's III, IV, V also finished first, second and third respectively in their divisions, following some stellar performances from all players. The highlight of the BUCS year, the BUCS individual's tournament in Nottingham, was also a huge success for the club - 16 players showed off their skills against universities from across the country. We had three victories here: **Esme Clayton** (Women's C Grade), **Harry Morris** (Men's G Grade), and **Gleb Kachur** (Men's E Grade).

As well as this, many of our players participate in the Durham and Cleveland Squash League, competing with a number of teams from around the county. These matches are always a favourite in the club, both for the highly competitive games and for the meal shared between teams afterwards. Durham has had some great successes in local leagues, with our men's II and women's I both winning their leagues! For the first

time we entered a mixed team in the men's league as well, which has been a very popular addition and our men's III performed exceptionally well in their debut year.
